



The Joint Health and Social Care Self-Assessment Framework Or Learning Disability Self-Assessment


The Joint Health and Social Care Self Assessment is also known as the LD SAF. It helps areas like Leicestershire to check that people with learning disabilities and their families

- get the same life chances as other people such as having a job or being safe where they live and
- Get good access to health services to stop them becoming unwell when this could have been stopped.

This year there is 1 question for people with learning disabilities and family carers to answer and 1 question just for family carers.

The answers you give will be kept anonymous - no one else will find out what individuals said unless we are worried that someone is being abused.

The answers you give will not affect any services you currently receive.



The Joint Health and Social Care Self-Assessment Framework is a list of things that areas - like Leicestershire, check to see how well services are doing in supporting people with learning disabilities and their families


There are three main areas of people lives that are being checked




Staying Healthy- This includes things like getting a good service from the doctors, chemist, dentists or when going to hospital.



Being Safe- This includes things like being safe in your home, in hospital or out and about where you live



Living Well- This is about things like having a say about how services should work or being welcomed by their community




The Self-Assessment will be completed as a partnership between people with learning disabilities, family carers, Leicestershire County Council and health.

It will be checked and signed by a person with a learning disability, a family carer, someone from Leicestershire County Council and someone from health.

We will use what you tell us in the self assessment to decide how we are doing. A draft of the self assessment will be ready in January 2015. The draft self assessment will be shown to the Learning Disability Partnership Board and will be available on the Better Lives website

The final Self Assessment will be ready in March 2015. It will be presented to the Leicestershire Health and Wellbeing Board by a family carer and a person with a learning disability.



Person with a learning disability


